Children with ependymoma may experience the following symptoms or signs. Sometimes, children with ependymoma do not show any of these symptoms. Or, these symptoms may be caused by a medical condition that is not a tumor.

- Headaches
- Seizures/convulsions, which are sudden involuntary movements of a person's muscles
- Nausea and vomiting
- Changes in vision, such as blurriness
- Difficulty with walking or balance
- Swelling of the nerve at the back of the eye

- Jerky eye movements

- Neck pain

If you are concerned about one or more of the symptoms or signs on this list, please talk with your child's doctor. Your doctor will ask how long and how often your child has been experiencing the symptom(s), in addition to other questions. This is to help find out the cause of the problem, called a [diagnosis](#) [3].

If a brain tumor is diagnosed, relieving symptoms remains an important part of care and treatment. This may also be called symptom management, palliative care, or supportive care. Be sure to talk with your child's health care team about symptoms your child experiences, including any new symptoms or a change in symptoms.
