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## **[Leukemia - Acute Myeloid - AML - Childhood - Coping with Side Effects](#) [1]**

[Fear of treatment side effects](#) [3] is common after a diagnosis of leukemia, but it may help to know that preventing and controlling side effects is a major focus of your child's health care team. This is called palliative care, and it is an important part of the overall treatment plan, regardless of the stage of disease.

There are possible side effects for every cancer treatment, but patients don't experience the same side effects when given the same treatments for many reasons. That can make it hard to predict exactly how your child will feel during treatment.

Common side effects from each treatment option for AML are described in detail within the [Treatment Options](#) [4] section. Learn more about [the most common side effects of leukemia and different treatments, along with ways to prevent or control them](#) [5]. Side effects depend on a variety of factors, including the subtype, the length and dosage of treatment(s), and your child's overall health.

### **Talking with your health care team about side effects**

Before treatment begins, talk with your child's doctor about possible side effects of each type of

treatment your child will be receiving. Ask which side effects are most likely to happen, when they are likely to occur, and what can be done to prevent or relieve them.

And, ask about the level of caregiving your child may need during treatment and recovery, as family members and friends often play an important role in the care of a child with AML. Learn more about [caregiving](#) [6].

In addition to physical side effects, there may be emotional and social effects as well. Patients and their families are encouraged to share their feelings with a member of their health care team who can help with [coping strategies](#) [7], including concerns about [managing the cost of your child's cancer care](#) [8].

During and after treatment, be sure to tell the health care team about the side effects your child experiences, even if you feel they are not serious. Sometimes, side effects can last beyond the treatment period, called a long-term side effect. A side effect that occurs months or years after treatment is called a [late effect](#) [9]. Treatment of both types of effects is an important part of survivorship care. Learn more by reading the [Follow-up Care](#) [10] section of this guide or talking with your child's doctor.
